Our CBE Board is interested in re-establishing connection with former members of our synagogue community, regardless of where they now live.



The TRUE Miracle of Chanukah

- 1. The Maccabees were willing to light the Temple *menorah* with that one container of oil, even though they thought it would not burn more than one day.
- 2. There were probably people who said:
 - "Why light a flame that is going to burn out?"
 - "Wait until we have enough oil."
 - "Wait until conditions are better."
- 3. Sometimes it's hard to start something when you can't be sure you'll succeed. You might think:
 - "Why bother?"
 - "I'll never be able to finish."
 - "I'll never figure it out."
- 4. YET...the Maccabees cleaned the Temple, removed the idols, took the opportunity they had and lit the *menorah* anyway!

- 5. Chanukah is the story of the fight for religious freedom.
- 6. Chanukah shows us that the Jewish people have always had the strength to:
 - live without guarantees of success
 - seize the opportunities available at the moment
- 7. The modern State of Israel is considered a miracle. There were those who said:
 - "Wait until your army is stronger."
 - "Wait until conditions are better."

But a group of people looked to the example of the Maccabees and had the courage to "light the flame."

8. SO...when you look at the little flames dancing on your *chanukiah* this holiday, take a moment to consider how the Maccabees must have felt when they poured that single container of oil into their *menorah* and kindled the flame.





My Brother-in-Law's* Excellent Latke Recipe

- 4 Large Russet or Idaho potatoes, peeled 1½ Large onions, peeled
- 3 Eggs whipped in blender 1 ½ C Matzah meal (or flour)
- 1. Grate potatoes and onions in a food processor on coarse setting or on the large holes of a box grater.
- 2. In a large bowl stir together grated potato mixture and whipped eggs. Then add matzah meal and stir until combined. Season with salt and pepper.
- 3. Heat ¼ inch peanut or vegetable oil in nonstick skillet over medium heat until shimmering. Add tablespoon-sized glop of mixture to skillet to form each latke. (If they're too big the latkes will be raw in the middle. Smaller latkes are crispier.)
- 4. Working in batches, fry latkes until gold brown and crisp, 3-4 minutes a side.
- 5. Place latkes on a rack set on a foil-lined baking sheet and keep warm in 200 degree oven.
- 6. Recipe yields about 36 latkes. Watch out for noshers hovering in the kirchen!

Have Some Fun With Your Latkes...Add Toppings!

- Nacho Top the latkes with warm refried beans, shredded cheddar, sliced pickled jalapenos, sour cream and thinly sliced scallions.
- Spicy Ricotta Heat honey with a pinch of red pepper flakes. Top the latkes with a spoonful of ricotta with a drizzle of spicy honey.
- Hummus/Olive Spread hummus on the latkes. Top with chopped pitted Kalamata olives and chopped parsley. Sprinkle with paprika and drizzle with oil.
- Pastramí Top the latkes with a small slice of pastrami, warmed sauerkraut and a dot of spicy brown mustard.

• Cucumber/Yogurt - Mix plain yogurt with a squeeze of lemon juice and a pinch of salt. Spoon onto the latkes. Top with za'atar, chopped cilantro and thinly sliced Persian cucumbers.



- Egg Salad Spoon egg salad onto the latkes, then top with chopped chives, dill and salmon roe.
- Giardiniera Pile chopped, drained giardiniera on latkes and top with small slices of beef salami.
- Fennel/Apple Toss thinly sliced fennel and julienned apple with lemon juice and olive oil. Season with salt and pepper. Pile on the latkes and top with fennel fronds.



Chanukah Candle Lighting Traditions

During Chanukah we read from the Torah and recite Hallel during synagogue services. But the most widely observed tradition takes place in our homes, where for eight nights we light the Chanukah candles then recite the blessings.

- 1. The chanukiah (9-branched Chanukah menorah) should be lit after sunset, when the first stars appear.
- 2. If possible, the *chanukiah* should be displayed in a window facing the street (or use a second electric *chanukiah* there) in order to observe the custom of pirsumei nisa, publicizing the miracle. Chanukah celebrates the fight for religious freedom. It is not enough to illuminate your home with light and warmth, but it is also necessary to illuminate your neighborhood and community. We want to let everyone families, parents and children take turns lighting the candles. know that it's Chanukah and that we are proud to be Jewish.
- 3. The Chanukah lights are for us to enjoy and are not to be used for anything else, not even to light another candle. That's why we use the shamash, the servant fire, would be considered work.) candle, to light the others.
- holder is taller that all the other candles, yours is a kosher (fit, proper) chanukiah.

5. Each night a new candle is added on the **right** side. The first night, place one candle on the far right as you face the chanukiah. The second night place two candles on the right, etc.





Because the *menorah* (the 7-branched holder) in the Temple in Jerusalem was lit with oil, some families use special oil chanukiot. While any type of oil can be used, olive oil is a favorite.

- 6. Every family has their own lighting customs. In some families each member lights their own chanukiah; in other
- 7. On Shabbat (Friday, December 11th this year), Chanukah candles are lit before Shabbat candles. (Once Shabbat candles have been lit, kindling Chanukah candles, creating
- 8. Candles should burn for at least half an hour. No regular 4. There are many styles of chanukiot. As long as the shamash work - no clearing the table or doing homework - should take place while they are burning. Relax, sing songs, eat latkes, play dreidel games!
