
We are proud of our pre-B'nai Mitzvah-age children as they

No Bake Chocolate-Tahini Pie

No-bake pies are perfect for hot summer days when we crave a sweet treat but are loath to turn on the oven. Whether you pick up a pre-made Oreo crust to make things even easier or make your

own, the sweet Oreo base is the perfect home for a light, nutty tahini mousse filling.

To make this totally vegan, use a non-dairy whipped topping, non-dairy cream cheese substitute in the filling, and non-dairy butter substitute in the crust and ganache.

Ingredients

- 24 Oreos (about 2 cups oreo crumbs)
- 4 Tbsp unsalted butter, melted

For filling

- 1 cup tahini, well-blended
- 1 8 oz package cream cheese, at room temperature
- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 1 8 oz package whipped topping (or make your own you will need 3 cups)

For topping

- 1 cup bittersweet chocolate chips
- 1/2 cup heavy cream (can also use coconut cream)
- 1 Tbsp toasted sesame seeds (optional garnish)

Directions

1. In a food processor, process the Oreos until they are fine crumbs. Combine with the melted butter and stir with a fork. Press crumbs in an even layer into a pie pan, and refrigerate for at least 30 minutes. (If you prefer you may bake the crust. To do so, preheat the oven to 350 degrees, prepare the crust the same way, and bake for 10 minutes. Allow to cool completely before filling.)

2. Combine tahini, cream cheese and powdered sugar in a stand mixer or in a bowl with a handheld mixer. Mix until smooth. Fold in whipped topping until the mixture is smooth and homogenous.

3. Pour the filling into the cooled pie crust and chill while you prepare the ganache topping.

4.Place chocolate chips in a bowl. In a heavy bottom sauce pot, heat ½ cup heavy cream until simmering. Pour heavy cream over chocolate chips and allow to sit for 5 minutes. Whisk until smooth, and then carefully pour over the tahini filling, smoothing the top.

5. Sprinkle with toasted sesame seeds around the edges, if using, and chill for at least an hour before serving.

This provocative novel raises urgent questions about family legacy, human trafficking, atonement and memory. Full of unexpected twists and humor, the story of an Israeli



Set in Havana in the 1920s and inspired by the immigration story of author Hamburger's grandmother, this historical novel follows a pair of

Jewish sisters who flee their shtetl on the Russian-Polish border in the hopes of immigrating to America. Instead, they are diverted to Cuba. The award-winning novelist richly captures the atmosphere of Cuba in pre-Castro times, as well as the sisters' distinctive sensibilities and their emotional journeys. It's a story of displacement, creativity and hope.



Elie Wiesel: Confronting the Silence by Joseph Berger

In the first biography published since the Nobel laureate's death in 2016, Berger draws on Elie Wiesel's own writings, research and new interviews with family members

and scholars to portray the man who lent his eloquent and powerful voice to preserving the memory of the Holocaust and standing up for human rights around the world. Berger, a longtime journalist for The New York Times, addresses the question of how this softspoken Hungarian-born survivor of Auschwitz became a towering world figure.

Sing, Memory: The Remarkable Story of the Man Who Saved the Music of the Nazi Camps by Makana Eyre

Beginning with its perfect title, this nonfiction work is an astonishing chronicle of musical resistance. Eyre, an American

journalist based in Paris, describes an unlikely friendship born in the Sachsenhausen concentration camp between a Jewish conductor, Rosebery d'Arguto, and a Polish political prisoner, Aleksander Kulisiewicz, an amateur musician who understood that music was a force for life. In Sachsenhausen, Jewish prisoners took part in a secret choir organized by d'Arguto, who had been a prominent musical director in Berlin. Kulisiewicz was asked by his friend, who died in the camp, to save the musical heritage of the victims, including the conductor's own compositions. Kulisiewicz, who survived the war, devoted his life to the task.



To Die Beautiful by Buzzy Jackson

While streets and memorials in Holland are named for Dutch resistance fighter Hannie Schaft, few in the United States know of her heroic role during World War II. Based

on extensive research, Jackson's debut historical novel highlights the courage and moral integrity of the law student turned armed fighter, who risked everything to defy the Nazis. In Holland, Schaft became the most wanted woman by the Nazis. She was eventually captured and executed just a few weeks before the Third Reich surrendered. Jackson, a historian and author of nonfiction works, learned about Schaft in a 2016 visit to the Verzetsmuseum, The Resistance Museum in Amsterdam.

First-ever Borscht Belt Museum Celebrates A Bygone Jewish Era

Many Jewish museums "can be a bit depressing," said Andrew Jacobs, president of the Museum's Board of Directors. "But I think there's a real craving for a museum that tells a story about Jews that is triumphant and joyous." After a dozen-plus years in the making, the Catskills Borscht Belt Museum is set to open in 2025.

The museum will be located in Ellenville, New York in a building that was once home to Home National Bank (one of the first banks to lend money to Jewish hotel owners in the 1920s.) Exhibits and activities will

include archival film and audio, lectures, interactive activities and workshops.

The timing for the museum opening is ideal. "We're tapping into this zeitgeist moment," Jacobs said, pointing to the Amazon Prime hit, *The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel*, and how it revived interest in the Catskills and its

heyday in the 1950s and

'60s. "Also, there's a sense that this time in history has been unacknowledged, underappreciated and hasn't gotten its due," he added.

Back in the day, from roughly the 1900s to the 1970s, Route 17, then better known as "The Quickway," was packed during the summer months with New York Jews making their exodus from the crowded city to the Catskill Mountains. Named after the Ashkenazi beet soup, the Borscht Belt drew travelers upstate for leisure, Yiddish culture, food and entertainment.

Of course, Jews also came to the Catskills because they were barred from vacationing at many other popular locales and therefore they created a vacationland of their own, packing Jewish-owned resorts like Grossinger's Catskill Resort Hotel and Kutsher's Hotel and Country Club.

"These institutions shaped American Jewish culture, enabling Jews to become more American, while at the same time introducing the American public to immigrant Jewish culture," according to the Catskills Institute, an organization at Northeastern University

Supreme Court Ruling in Sabbath Accommodation Case Has Far-Reaching Consequences for Observant Jews

WASHINGTON (JTA) In a case that drew support from a broad array of Jewish groups, the Supreme Court ruled unanimously that employers had to show a "substantial" burden to deny workers religious accommodation.

In its decision, the court sided with Gerald Groff, an evangelical Christian mail carrier who asked not to work on Sundays, his Sabbath. Jewish groups that do not

often line up on the same side of church-state issues before the court were of a single voice in this case.

Justice Samuel Alito, writing the opinion, sought to substantially narrow a 1977 decision that faith groups have for years said is so broad in setting the standard for religious accommodation that it is meaningless.

"We think it is enough to say that an employer must show that the burden of granting an accommodation would result in substantial increased costs in relation to the conduct of its particular business," Alito said.

The previous decision had said that "to require TWA to bear more than a *de minimis* cost in order to give Hardison Saturdays off is an undue hardship." (The now defunct airline in that case was the employer and Larry Hardison was the employee seeking the Sabbath off.) With this ruling "substantial" effectively replaces "de minimus," or "minimal," as the standard.

The decision will have far-reaching consequences for Orthodox Jews, said Mitchel Aeder, the Orthodox Union's president. "Members of our community require accommodations for Sabbath and holiday observance, times to pray, the ability to keep *kosher* and the like," he said in a statement. "Such accommodations enable us to be not only faithful Jews but productive workers and members of American society. That is why the Orthodox Union advocated to the Court in support of Mr. Groff and why we welcome this landmark ruling."

A number of Orthodox groups filed *amicus* briefs last year. This year, the Anti-Defamation League and the American Jewish Committee, civil rights groups that have often argued for church-state separations, also backed Groff in *amicus* briefs.

"Not every belief or practice can be accommodated,

but experience has shown that with some effort and goodwill, most can," Marc Stern, the AJC's chief legal officer, said in an email. "The court's insistence that hardship on employers means substantial hardship and not *de minimis* hardship, puts real teeth into the law."

Alito, in his decision, quoted the Orthodox Union's *amicus* brief. Because of the 1977 ruling, Alito quoted the brief as saying "Orthodox Jews once again [are] left at the mercy of their employers' good graces."

He also quoted the Council on American-Islamic Relations, which noted employer restrictions on clothing, an area that Orthodox Jews have also cited in the past.

"Muslim women wearing religiously mandated attire have lost employment opportunities and have been excluded from 'critical public institutions like public schools, law enforcement agencies, and youth rehabilitation centers,'" Alito wrote, citing parts of the CAIR amicus brief.









Congregation Beth El has held Youth Services almost every summer since its founding in 1947. This program was initially organized and run by Lee Katz, followed by Adelle Wiener and is presently overseen by Ruth Spitz. The service itself is conducted by post-*B'nai Mitzvah* young adults, and Hebrew and English parts are led by children staying at Old Colony Beach/Old Lyme area in July and/or August or by those visiting family and friends. I was fortunate to find a list of the names of those young adults, dating back to 1949, but it is incomplete. We've been able to fill in some blanks by looking through photo albums, but the list is still missing names and dates.
